

Common Plants Toxic To Pets



Amaryllis

Toxic to dogs and cats. Bulbs contain the most toxins.

Symptoms include vomiting, depression, diarrhea, abdominal pain, excessive drooling, anorexia, and tremors.



Autumn Crocus

Toxic to dogs and cats.

Symptoms include oral irritation, bloody vomiting, diarrhea, shock, multi-organ damage, and bone marrow suppression.



Azalea/Rhododendron

Toxic to dogs, cats, horses, goats, and sheep.

Symptoms include acute digestive upset, excessive drooling, loss of appetite, frequent bowel movements, colic, loss of coordination, stupor, leg paralysis, weak heart rate, and possible death.



Castor Bean

Toxic to dogs, cats, and horses.

Symptoms include abdominal pain, drooling, vomiting, diarrhea, excessive thirst, weakness, loss of appetite, tremors, seizures, coma, and possible death.



Chrysanthemum

Toxic to dogs and cats.

Symptoms include vomiting, depression, diarrhea, excessive drooling, and dermatitis.



Cyclamen

Toxic to dogs and cats, especially the tubers or roots.

Symptoms include gastrointestinal irritation, including intense vomiting, and possible death.



Daffodil

Toxic to dogs and cats. Bulbs contain the most toxins.

Symptoms include vomiting, salivation, diarrhea; large ingestions cause convulsions, low blood pressure, tremors, and irregular heartbeat.



Ivy (California, Branching, Glacier, & English Ivy)

Toxic to dogs and cats. Foliage contain the most toxins.

Symptoms include vomiting, abdominal pain, excessive drooling, and diarrhea.



Japanese Yew

Toxic to dogs, cats, and horses. General ingestion of any part of the tree (except the flesh of the berry) can be very dangerous.

Symptoms include trembling, loss of coordination, difficulty breathing, gastrointestinal irritation, heart failure, and possible death.



Kalanchoe

Toxic to dogs and cats.

Symptoms include vomiting, abdominal pain, low blood pressure, diarrhea, and irregular heartbeat.



Lilies

Toxic to cats. Types include Tiger, Asian, Japanese Show, Easter, Stargazer, and Casa Blanca.

Symptoms include vomiting, lack of appetite, lethargy, dehydration, and kidney failure.

Common Plants Toxic To Pets



Marijuana

Toxic to all animals.

Symptoms include diarrhea, vomiting, increased heart rate, drooling, loss of coordination, seizures, panic, and possible coma.



Oleander

Toxic to dogs, cats, and horses.

Symptoms include colic, diarrhea (possibly bloody), sweating, loss of coordination, shallow/difficult breathing, muscle tremors, paralysis, and possible death from heart failure.



Peace Lily

Toxic to dogs and cats.

Symptoms include oral irritation, excessive drooling, vomiting, difficulty in swallowing and intense burning and irritation of the mouth, lips and tongue.



Pothos

Toxic to dogs and cats.

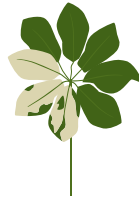
Symptoms include oral irritation, intense burning and irritation of mouth, tongue and lips, excessive drooling, vomiting, and difficulty swallowing.



Sago Palm

Toxic to all animals. All parts are poisonous, but especially the seeds.

Symptoms include vomiting, bloody diarrhea or black stool, yellowing of the whites of the eyes, increased thirst, bruising, impaired blood clotting, liver damage or failure, and possible death.



Schefflera

Toxic to dogs and cats.

Symptoms include oral irritation, excessive drooling, vomiting, difficulty in swallowing, and intense burning and irritation of the mouth, lips, and tongue.



Tulip/Narcissus

Toxic to dogs, cats, and horses. Bulbs contain the most toxins.

Symptoms include intense gastrointestinal irritation, drooling, loss of appetite, depression of the central nervous system, convulsions, and heart abnormalities.
